STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE**

The Fenwick Flagpole is of historical/associate value because of its significance to the community. It was moved from Fenwick Public School (SS#9) to the center of the village of Fenwick at the intersection of Canboro Road and Maple Street in 1929. At this time, a siren was mounted on the pole to warn residents of fire, and also in case the need to rally or evacuate arose. During the next few decades, it donned a sign on the flag staff that said "Welcome to Fenwick". Monumental events, such as the return of veterans from the Second World War, were celebrated around the flagpole. The flagpole is of contextual value because, as the nucleus of the Fenwick community, it is important in defining the character of the area and is a major point of reference. The Flagpole is a rare and unique example of a metal, multi-legged flagpole. Key attributes that support its cultural heritage value include its location in the intersection, its steel and aluminum construction, weathered galvanized colour, revolving top with a 6" ball and a halyard system.
